Marine Tide App

Looking for a basic tide app? Look no further. Tide Graph is a good basic app for those just getting into tides. For those more advanced, or just like more information, there is Tide Graph Pro and Tide Graph HD. All found in the app store. Other brands are available, but I have found this to be a start.

Are you using the right fuel and oil in your engine?

I recently attended a conference in Sacramento to discuss some issues facing the boating industry. One of the "hot issues" was Ethanol Fuel. You may have read a letter on the topic, but if you aren't familiar with it, here is some information to consider.

The EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) is pushing the auto/truck standard from the current 10 percent ethanol blends, E10, to 15 percent blends, E15, to meet the mandates of the Renewable Fuel Standard. Unfortunately, there are some unintended damaging consequences for boaters.

Tests conducted by marine engine manufacturers under the direction of the Department of Energy's National Renewable Energy Laboratory concluded that E15 fuels not only damage marine engines, they exceed the EPA emission standards.

Many recreational boaters fill up their vessels, and gas cans for their boats, at gas stations. There should be a warning label posted at the pump indicating this potential damage that may occur. Unfortunately, many stations do not have these labels posted, or we aren't looking for them.

As you prepare your boat for the season, you may want to be sure you fill your boat fuel tanks with the

best fuel to work with your engine so far, marina with fuel docks seem to be the best choice.

On another part of your engine, you will want to be sure to start with the right lubricant. There are two main categories of marine outboard engines: two-stroke and four-stroke. Most newer engines today are four-stroke, but let's face it, there are still a lot of two-strokes out there. The lubrication requirements for each type is very different because of how each system works. In two-stroke engines, the oil is mixed with the fuel and lubricates the engine as it passes through. It burns along with the fuel and exits via the exhaust system. Four-stroke engines are lubricated by oil that repeatedly is pumped from and returned to a sump, just as in a car or truck.

Although the four-stroke performs the same function as a vehicle engine, auto lubricants should not be used for two primary reasons: water and wear! Oil made for autos are not set up to protect engines against the corrosion water may cause, and because four-stroke engines run faster and spend longer periods not being used, the same oil is not interchangeable.

So, with all this information, it is suggested to check out the manufacturer of your engine for the correct lubricant, and fuel, or to look for the National Marine Manufacturers Assoc. (NMMA) logo on the oil. You may find TC-W3 oils are certified for two-stroke engines, FC-W for four-stroke engines. Be sure to check them all out, to get the correct one.
