Preparation is Key

With the winter weather still here, there are a few things to consider:


- 1. Check your dock lines frayed lines will break sooner rather than later, and chances are, all 4 lines should be replaced.
- 2. Check sheets they loosen with the movement of the boat, so secure them all.
- 3. Check sails we always loose at least one jib or sail during the winter weather, don't let it be yours this year.
- 4. Check your fenders it's an easy fix, not too expensive considering having to repaint your hull or any other damage.
- 5. Check items on deck seriously, if it isn't nailed down, it will disappear in the winds they always do ③.
- 6. Check your scuppers being in a farm area, there is always peat dirt that plug the drains. Be sure yours are flowing.
- Check inside your boat now is the time to find out if you have a leak. Finding out later only creates more headache and could be way worse.

Bridge Updates


Timeline Extended - Marine Traffic Bridge Closures in SJ County Through March



San Joaquin County movable-span bridges will be temporarily closed to marine traffic through **March 29**. The bridges will be open to vehicles but may be reduced to one lane of travel at times.

Affected bridges are the Eight Mile Road Bridge at Honker Cut Canal, the Bacon Island Road Bridge at Middle River, and the Tracy Boulevard Bridge at the Grant Line Canal.

Isleton Bridge Scheduled for Daily Closures Through June 30



The Isleton Bridge on State Route 160 near the city of Isleton will be closed to all motorists during daytime hours into the early evening. The closures are to allow ongoing parts replacements, and mechanical and electrical control system upgrades.

River Road and the Walnut Grove Bridge will be the alternate route.

Closures will take place 6 a.m.-6 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays through **June 30**. Weather conditions could delay or cancel scheduled work on some days.

Golden Mussel impacts

Economic Impacts: Golden Mussels are a serious economic threat to California's infrastructure. Mussels can clog water intakes, fish screens, irrigation pumps, and hydropower

facilities. Environmental Impacts:

These freshwater mussels are filter feeders that consume large quantities of microscopic organisms, competing with native species and sportfish. **The balance of an entire waterbody can be disturbed**.

How to identify it? •Found mainly in freshwater and brackish water Under 1.5 inches in length •Attaches to hard surfaces Shell color is light

ohei Color is igni golden to darker yellowish-brown Similar to quagga and zebra mussels

Ballast water requirements* to prevent the spread:

- Minimize or avoid the uptake of ballast water in areas known to have Golden Mussels, including the Port of Stockton
- Maintain and calibrate ballast water treatment systems
- Report any ballast water treatment system malfunction to the California State Lands Commission as soon as practicable
